YOUTH SPONSORED ADVENT MISSION PROJECT



December 1, 7pm

With the holidays fast approaching, why not find space for yourself and rediscover the wonder this Advent season brings. Janet Dahl used a Gratitude Scripture journal during the month of November and is sharing this practice with an Advent Scripture Journal. This is a practice that encourages one to be focused and intentional while sitting down with scripture. It can be an active and creative process reflecting, responding, and remembering God's word. Begin each day writing something you are grateful for. Then read the daily scripture and question to reflect upon, through writing, drawing, or doodling.

Wherever you are on life's journey, you are welcome here!

The angel replied, "The Holy Spirit will come over you and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. Therefore, the one who is to be born will be holy. He will be called God's Son. Look, even in her old age, your relative Elizabeth has conceived a son. This woman who was labeled 'unable to conceive' is now six months pregnant. Nothing is impossible for God. " -Luke 1:35-37

There is no getting around the fact that Christmas 2020 is not going to be what we would have chosen. We are all old enough to remember a variety of Christmases. Some we remember for how special they were: we made cutout cookies and unwrapped presents and sang carols with people we love. Some (hopefully not many) we remember for how tough they were. We were sick with the flu and missed out on all the fun. There was an empty seat at the table where there should have been that person we love. No matter how we try to make the best of it, Christmas 2020 is looking more tough than special.

As of mid-November when I'm writing this, we are in a time of trouble. The United States, and especially Wisconsin, and in particular Dane county, face exploding numbers of covid-19 infections. Everyone is trying to cope with loss in some form. There are great losses like a job, a home, or a family member. There are small losses like a canceled Christmas party. In between those extremes are a thousand medium-sized losses. One at a time, we can mostly deal with them, but all together they can really drag us down. It's like having the flu all year long. We are weary of missing out on all the fun.

Two thousand twenty years ago, a child named Jesus was born into a world very different from ours. But just like us, his family could not get around the fact that things were not as they would have chosen.

His parents were dealing with an unplanned pregnancy. There must have been gossip and all kinds of unpleasant drama in their extended family. Their situation was made worse by living under the double insult of a corrupt monarchy and a brutal empire. Caesar had decided that everyone under Roman rule needed to be counted. In person. There was no census.gov or broadband access, so instead of getting their home ready for a new baby, Mary and Joseph were forced to make a dangerous journey on foot and donkey to a distant city just to complete the census. Their Christmas was spent giving birth in a stinky barn with no midwife, no bed, and no running water. I think we can safely say that Christmas in the Year One was not a what they had planned.

However.

Aside from some confusing and freaky messages from an angel, Mary and Joseph could never have guessed what Christmas 0001 would turn out to be. The day brought not only angels, shepherds, wise men, and a miraculous deliverance from Kind Herod, but it also brought the salvation of the whole world. I'm not saying that Christmas 2020 is going to turn out anything like that. But with God, you never know.

SOCIAL JUSTICE CORNER

At that time Emperor Augustus ordered a census to be taken throughout the Roman Empire. --Lamentations 3:19

This month's Social Justice Corner is all about a word we rarely hear. Maybe you have never heard it. STATELESS. Being stateless means not being a citizen of any country. Someone could be an immigrant or refugee and not be a citizen of the country in which they live. This is different. Stateless people are not a citizen of the country they were born in, the country they live in, or any other country in the world.

It's difficult to imagine how hard life is for someone who has no nationality. No matter what country they live in, they have almost none of the legal rights of their neighbors who are citizens. They have no passport, so they can't travel to another country. They have no rights to get a job, send their children to school, seek help from government agencies, get a driver's license or even a library card. They live in the shadows, afraid of being hurt by people who would take advantage of their vulnerable situation.

We rarely hear about statelessness in the media. There was a Tom Hanks movie some years ago called "The Terminal" about a man who lost his citizenship while traveling and got stuck living in an airport. He spent his days wandering from gate to gate and trying to convince some country, any country, to accept him. That was a fictional story. We could imagine there might be a few dozen people in the world in this odd situation. Maybe a few hundred

In reality, there are at least 4 million people in the world without a nationality. The United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) estimates there are probably closer to 10 million, because many countries do not even try to count them. People are stateless for a variety of reasons. Some become stateless because they are forced to flee across a border due to violence or persecution, then find that neither country is willing to recognize them as citizens. This is what has happened to people in the Rohingya ethnic group in Myanmar who fled to Bangladesh under military attack.

Some people are born stateless. They are not recognized by the country they are born in for some reason, for example because their parents belong to two different religions. That is what happened to a woman named Maha Mamo. I urge you to read about her on UNHCR's website: https://www.unhcr.org/ibelong/maha-mamo/. Even if you don't read the article, you really need to watch this short video in which she tells her own incredibly inspiring story: https://www.facebook.com/UNHCR/videos/my-story-maha-mamo/1856300964508955/

If learning about people without a country makes you want to help them, you can sign this "open letter" (kind of like a petition) from UNHCR to world leaders, asking for a commitment to end statelessness: https://www.unhcr.org/ibelong/sign-the-open-letter/. Let your signature show that you believe all of God's children deserve to have a place where they belong.
